Dear Parents and Carers,

I write to you at the end of a busy Spring Term. There have been many exciting events and competitions happening and we'll explore these in more detail in a minute, but I don't think that I can write this message without mention of snow and strike action.

Regarding both challenges, I want to say a big thank you for your patience and understanding. The snow came thick and fast on that Thursday morning, exceeding initial forecasts and we quickly learnt that it is not possible to rely on the roads being suitably treated any more than we can rely on weather forecasting. My headteacher colleagues across the South of the City were all caught out by this and many schools had to close at the last minute leading to difficulties in journeys home for many. We certainly listened to your feedback and made sure that we were not caught out by a similar pattern on Friday. It is always difficult to get the balance right in these situations, and I'm sorry that so many of you faced such disruption that day.

Regarding the recent education strike action, I'm also sorry that we have faced further disruption to our school day, and again I thank you for your patience and understanding. As headteachers we are caught in the middle of a dichotomy. On the one hand we must do everything we can to support the delivery of high quality education for our students, but on the other hand we absolutely respect the right of employees to take a stand for the long term future of education. I know that many of my colleagues in school have been truly conflicted by this seemingly impossible choice, and the real sadness about this whole situation is that it might have been avoided if sensible negotiations with the government had been allowed to take place earlier. I remain optimistic that the situation can be resolved quickly and fairly because we all want to be able to get back to the important business of inspiring young minds.

On top of all of this we had strike disruption to our public transport system. As I write, the bus drivers have called off their industrial action and we are all greatly relieved to be getting back to some sort of normal. I know that many students have suffered longer and more complicated journeys to school and back, and I wanted to commend the fortitude of our families in the face of such adversity.

My thanks and respect to the students, parents and staff who have shown great resilience and optimism throughout these challenges. Yes, it has been frustrating at times, but we all continue to work hard to minimise the disruption faced.

You will remember from my last report that the new Development Office has recently been established and already several alumni events have taken place. Meanwhile in school we continue to provide a breath-taking array of enrichment. We have had academic competitions, house competitions, sports fixtures, large-scale trips, fantastic music & drama and many more lunchtime and after-school Clubs & Societies.

On the academic enrichment front we've had a Maths Problem Solving competition, Imperial War Museum trip, Geology Museum trip, Next Generation Awards competition, Business Languages Day, Chemistry Olympiad, Maths Challenges and Feasts, Cambridge Chemistry Race, Lessons from Auschwitz trip, Physics Big Quiz, Philosothon competition, Physics Olympiad, Chris Bradford author visit, Central Mosque and St Martins church visits, Royal Society Book prize competition, WMCTC Chemistry Quiz (which we won!), Chess tournaments, House Quizzes and Public Speaking competitions.

We even had our first Ski Trip since the pandemic which was enjoyed by students and staff, and already we are planning next year's trip.

We also look forward to the Berlin Trip, the German Homestay visits, Harry Potter Studio Tours, Falconry displays, Cadbury World trips, the Senior Concert, Geography Field Trips and more Duke of Edinburgh expeditions.

Our Careers support team have been extraordinarily busy too, with careers interviews for Year 11 and Year 12, UCAS information evening for Y12 and their parents, Higher Education Day, Lecture visits to the University of Birmingham, Model United Nations Day, Cambridge Masterclasses, and our Post-18 Day.

Sport continues to flourish in all domains. The matches at Camp Hill Rugby Club, the annual battle against KES, and the Foundation XV against Solihull were spectacles of a highly successful rugby season. We have also enjoyed the Rosslyn Park Sevens tournament and school fixtures across all year groups. The annual swimming gala was a great success too, enjoyed by competitors and spectators alike.

The highlight of the sporting term has to be the Junior and Senior Rugby & Hockey Tours. The feedback from teachers, parents and the opposition staff was delightful – the boys clearly worked hard and played hard and were outstanding ambassadors for the school. It was an emotional final hurrah for the Year 13 students after an exceptional 7-year career at CHB – we will miss them!

The music and drama departments have been busier than ever. The annual trip to Symphony Hall was another great success. We had the Tea Time Concert which was well supported by you the families. Many students have recently taken their ABRSM instrumental or singing examinations. And the Senior Production of One Man Two Guvnors was a triumph – the audience loved every moment and the cast were clearly relishing the opportunity to entertain. Well done to the plethora of students and staff involved in all of the rehearsals, stage management, music, costumes, props,

set design, sound and lighting. This was a huge project and my congratulations and thanks to Mr Dowling for masterminding it.

Parents Evenings continue with our hybrid mix of face-to-face and online meetings. Your feedback has been almost literally split down the middle. We know that many of you prefer the personalised nature of face-to-face meetings but an equal number of you prefer the convenience and efficiency of online meetings. We continue to work hard to listen to your feedback and achieve a satisfactory balance between the two approaches.

On the subject of feedback, I wanted to thank the attendees at our recent Parents Focus Group meetings where we focused on pastoral care, communication and behaviour policy. Your feedback is helping us to formulate our policy and practices, and it also helps us to strengthen and protect all of the good things we are already doing. When we invited parents to take part in these meetings the response was overwhelming, so apologies to those who have still not been invited – we are working through the list of volunteers and you will get a chance to join us in one of our future meetings.

The Association of Friends of the School (AFS) ran a highly successful Quiz Night and it was great to see families, staff and friends battling with the questions set by our very own quizmaster Mr Hill. The winning team were, I'm told, impressive, but it's not just about winning, it's very much about taking part! Please watch out for future events, and do consider offering your time to volunteer to help run some of these events. The AFS have been working hard on building community and raising money for the school. Recently they have generously supported funding for cameras for Photography Club, support for Y13 Prom tickets, Music folders, and a replacement for our tired old cricket score board. I'll finish by sharing the news that planning permission for our new All Weather sports pitch has finally been granted and we are now working on the delivery phase of the project. We are hopeful that the tendering process will enable the school to secure a contractor who offers excellent value for money whilst building a pitch of the highest quality. This facility will not only provide for hockey matches to be played at home, but will save us money as we no longer need to hire other local pitches, and generate letting income as we open our doors to local hockey clubs. It will also allow evening training sessions for all sports to be extended as it will benefit from lighting systems, and it will provide additional recreational space for students at break and lunch. It's an exciting project and a welcome addition to the school's facilities.

Not since the pandemic struck has the school been so active and reclaimed so much of that community coherence that we were so used to. Bravo to the students and staff for this gargantuan fight back! And thank you to the parents and families who have supported us all the way!

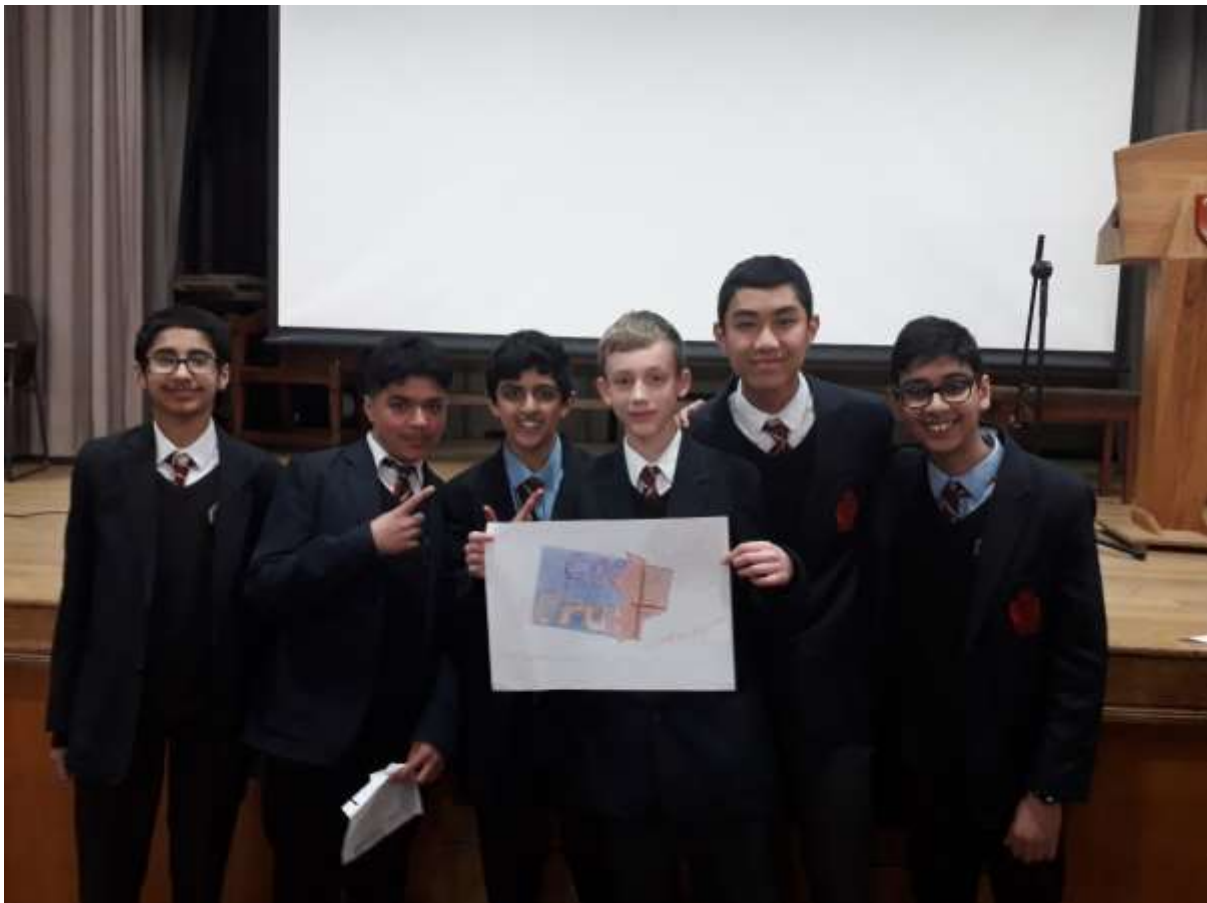

A Letter from our Visiting German Teachers

Dear all,

We are Mara-Hélène Müller and Lena Pasemann. We are two German guest teachers currently working on our undergraduate degrees. Mara studies English and History with teacher training at the University of Koblenz, Lena studies German and Economics with teacher training at the University of Magdeburg.

Partnered with the University of Birmingham and the IGES (Institute for German and European Studies), we are at Camp Hill as part of the project *Teaching German in a Transcultural World*. Within this project, a few German university students undertaking teacher training were given the opportunity for a four-week School Placement in the West Midlands. Thus, we were assigned Camp Hill School for Boys.

Our tasks at Camp Hill included not only the observation of lessons but also German pronunciation practice with Year 7-12 students, as well as teacher assistance. Especially the pronunciation practice was beneficial for the students, teachers and us alike. To us it was particularly valuable because we are both aspiring language teachers and here, we get to experience what it is like to teach pupils a foreign language, namely German.

We are very impressed, however, with the fluency and accuracy we have encountered with most students. Most of the time, the errors we have had to correct were minor.

The most striking differences that we noticed about the school systems in the UK and Germany were first and foremost the school uniforms, obviously. To add to that, students at Camp Hill can choose between a much wider range of courses than we are used to. Also, at this school a much more advanced level of proficiency is expected from both the teachers and the students. Furthermore, students at Camp Hill are very respectful and disciplined. However, we also noticed that the English school system can be quite expensive, whereas education is freely accessible in Germany. It is very nice to see though that Camp Hill students get to be part of this school due to their intelligence rather than their financial stability.

We particularly enjoyed the conversation with the Camp Hill boys, the opportunity to talk about Germany and the differences between England and Germany, especially in regard to the different school systems. The warm-hearted welcome from the staff surprised us and we will forever remember this team as a competent, caring, and professional one.

We are glad and grateful to have had the opportunity to be part of something this big and influential. It is with great humility that we hope to have made an impact on the students in the same way they have on us. After this School Placement, particularly in our future careers as teachers in Germany, we will look back fondly on the memories we have shared not only with the staff but also with the students at Camp Hill School. Thank you for having us, it was an honour.

Biology

Year 13 Biology event – CSI Blood Pool workshop

Just last week, I attended an exciting and educational workshop covering a variety of topics related to crime scene investigation, such as crime scene photo analysis, suspects' motives and alibis, ABO blood typing and DNA electrophoresis, case conclusions and an expert witness courtroom quiz.

We started by recalling information from a crime scene photo, which tested our attention to detail. Through this exercise, we were able to recognise the importance of even the smallest and seemingly insignificant details in an investigation.

The simulated ABO blood typing activity provided a hands-on experience, allowing me to understand the principles of blood typing and its importance in criminal investigations. The DNA electrophoresis practical showcased how multiple samples can be used to analyse DNA differences, which is an important step in solving criminal cases.

To wrap up, we were put to the ultimate test of providing a compelling testimony - the most crucial aspect of any criminal investigation. For a moment, I was Sherlock Holmes when I used the subtle details from the evidence of DNA and blood from the crime scene, along with the police statements to decipher suspects' potential motives and alibis, to successfully deduce who was the culprit.

Forensic science events are phenomenal, inspiring future scientists and promoting knowledge in this exciting field!

History

Visit to Imperial War Museum on 12 January

On a dark morning in January, 60 Year 9 students embarked on an eagerly anticipated visit to the Imperial War Museum. The main focus of the visit was to learn more about the Holocaust from the recently reopened exhibition which the Imperial War Museum has had for the last couple of decades. The exhibit has taken advantage of recent scholarly research and reflections in the wider field of Holocaust studies to provide a more inclusive and reflective exhibition, looking at the experiences of individuals caught up in the horrors of the early 20th Century, in which the focus on the steps towards the 'Final Solution' are made more pertinent. Using iPads as guides, our students were able to find out about this topic extensively in order to support their later learning in class.

Beyond this central focus for the visit, groups also had the chance to explore the galleries looking at the First and Second World Wars which also provide a focus for much of the work done in Year 9 and into GCSE studies. The focus on global conflict has been a recent focus in the improvement of these exhibits and the artefacts, interactions and stories really bring to life the scale of these events and the impact they had across all parts of the World. We were also able to visit the Ashcroft Gallery of Victoria Cross heroes, those who served (and often died) for valour in the British and Empire forces from the mid-19th Century to the modern day. The sheer range of backgrounds and experiences of the service personnel commemorated was intriguing. Arduous journeys to and from London could have taken their toll on the morale of the students but all managed the long day successfully and were able to return to Birmingham very much more enlightened and informed.
